## **Nationwide Crime Analysis 2025 vs 2024**

Preliminary figures for 2025 indicate that major crimes decreased by 15% with 2,409 cases, compared to 2,825 in 2024. There were regional decreases across the board in New Providence, Grand Bahama and the Northern Bahamas and the Family Islands District at rates of 16%, 8% and 13% respectively.

Crimes against the person decreased by 27% with 509 incidents, compared to 696 in 2024. There were regional decreases in crimes against the person across the board at rates of 27% in New Providence, 31% in Grand Bahama and 20% in the Family Islands District. Crimes against the property decreased by 11%, with 1,900 incidents, compared to 2,129 in 2024. There were regional decreases at rates of 12% in New Providence, 2% in Grand Bahama and 12% in the Family Islands District.

**Homicides** decreased by 31% with 83 incidents, compared to 120 in 2024. There were 76 murders in New Providence, 4 in the Family Islands and 3 in the Grand Bahama District. The overall clearance rate stands at 65%. Victims between the ages of 18 and 45 represent 83% of all homicides. Retaliation, gang and conflict were the most common motives for murder, representing 43% collectively. Based on preliminary figures, homicides were more likely to occur on a Sunday than any other day of the week. Homicides were more prevalent in the **South Central** and **Southern Divisions**, accounting for 36% of the overall total. Firearms were used in the commission of 64 homicides and fatal gunshot wounds remain the leading cause of death in these matters. Males represent the highest percentage of victims of murder at 93%, compared to female victims at 7%.

**Armed Robberies** decreased by 39% with 162 incidents, compared to 265 over the same period in 2024. Armed robberies were more prevalent in the **Southeastern, Southwestern, and South Central Divisions**, accounting for 55% of the overall total. Based on preliminary figures, armed robberies were more likely to occur on a Monday and Thursday than any other day of the week and these incidents peak between the hours of 8pm and 12am. Most armed robberies occurred at the street level, businesses and at residences respectively. Firearms continue to be the weapon of choice for the commission of armed robberies. Notably, there were 60 vehicles taken in the commission of these incidents. Thirty-eight percent of vehicles taken during armed robberies were recovered. Males represent the highest percentage of victims of armed robbery at 67%, compared to female victims at 33%.

**Robberies** decreased by 22% with 46 incidents, compared to 59 in 2024. Robberies were more prevalent in the Cable Beach and Central Divisions, accounting for 35% of the overall total. Based on preliminary figures, robberies were more likely to occur on a Sunday and Monday than any other day of the week and these incidents peak between the hours of 8pm to 12am. Two vehicles were taken in the commission of robbery incidents and 1 was recovered. Males represent the highest percentage of victims at 73%, compared to female victims at 27%.

**Stolen vehicles** increased by 2% with 398 incidents, compared to 392 in 2024. Nissan make vehicles were the most targeted, representing 75% of all vehicles stolen. The Nissan Cube and Note were the predominant models stolen, while residences were the most targeted locations.

Stolen vehicles were mostly reported in the **Southwestern** and **Southeastern Divisions**, accounting for 47% of the overall total. Fifty-nine percent of all stolen vehicles were recovered.

**Stealing from vehicles** increased by 7% with 200 incidents, compared to 187 in 2024. The most frequent items stolen included cash, cellular phones, tools and other personal effects. Nissan March and Honda Accords were mostly targeted in the commission of these offences. Based on preliminary figures, stealing from vehicles were more likely to occur on a Wednesday than any other day of the week. Stealing from vehicles were mostly reported in the **South Central**, **Southeastern** and **Northeastern Divisions**, accounting for 41% of recorded cases.

**Housebreakings** decreased by 49% with 170 incidents, compared to 331 in 2024. The **New Providence District** accounted for 77 or 45% of all housebreakings. **Grand Bahama**, including **Abaco and Bimini**, accounted for 44 or 26% of housebreakings. The **Family Islands District** accounted for 49 or 29% of housebreakings, most of which occurred in **Eleuthera** with 25 incidents.

**Shopbreakings** decreased by 13% with 273 incidents, compared to 315 in 2024. The **New Providence District** accounted for 188 or 69% of all shopbreakings. **Grand Bahama**, including **Abaco and Bimini**, accounted for 49 or 18% of shopbreakings, most of which occurred in the **Abaco Division** with 17 incidents. The **Family Islands District** accounted for 36 or 13% of shopbreakings, most of which occurred in **Eleuthera** with 21 incidents. Based on preliminary figures, shopbreakings were more likely to occur on a Friday than any other day of the week.

For the period in review, a total of 366 **firearms** and 11,238 rounds of ammunition were discovered and/or seized throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. As a result, 828 persons were arrested and 292 persons were charged with illegal firearms and ammunition offences. **ShotSpotter Technology** detected 970 gunshot incidents, consisting of 544 multiple shots, 334 single shots and 92 probable shots, totaling 3,278 rounds discharged.

Notably, the officers of the Royal Bahamas Police Force conducted 24,947 field check patrols, 139,904 stop and search profiles, 6,618 road checks, 4,337 warrants of arrest and 3,433 search warrants throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. As a result of these efforts, 16,117 persons were arrested for various major and minor offences. Of this number, 12,243 persons were charged and placed before the Court, representing a 76% charge rate. There were 5,215 court returns which included 3,663 convictions, 20 cases were discharged due to the defendant's death, 146 cases were acquitted at the end of trial, 721 cases were discharged by the court and 665 cases were withdrawn by the virtual complainant.





In 2025, murders decreased by 31% with 83 incidents, compared to 120 in 2024.













## Sexual Offences





## Armed Robbery

Armed robberies decreased by 39% with 162 incidents, compared to 265 in 2024.





### Armed Robbery - Police Divisions




### Armed Robbery – Weapon Type





In 2025, housebreakings decreased by 49% with 170 incidents, compared to 331 in 2024.


## Stolen Vehicles

Stolen vehicles increased by 2% with 398 cases, compared to 392 in 2024. Of this total, 238 vehicles were recovered.





### Stolen Vehicles - Vehicle Make 2025




### Stolen Vehicles - Vehicle Model 2025




### Stolen Vehicles - Targeted Year (Model) 2025




### Stolen Vehicles - Incident Location 2025


### Stolen Vehicles - Time of Day 2025

## Missing Persons 2025

## Persons Arrested

In 2025, the Royal Bahamas Police Force arrested 16,117 persons for various major and minor offences throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. **New Providence** accounted for 11,774 or 73% of all persons arrested, **Grand Bahama & the Northern Bahamas** accounted for 3,192 or 20%, and the **Family Islands District** accounted for 1,151 or 7%. Males accounted for 13,755 or 85% of arrests, and females accounted for the remaining 2,362 or 15% of arrests.




### Arrests - Policing Division



### Arrests - Policing Department/Operations


## Persons Charged

The Royal Bahamas Police Force charged 12,243 persons for various major and minor offences throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. **New Providence** accounted for 9,333 or 76% of all persons charged, **Grand Bahama and the Northern Bahamas** accounted for 2,198 or 18%, and the **Family Islands District** accounted for 712 or 6%. Males accounted for 9,937 or 81% of persons charged, and females accounted for the remaining 2,306 or 19% of persons charged.




There were 16,117 persons arrested, of which 76% or 12,243 suspects were charged before the Court.

### Persons Charged




### Males vs. Females




## Court Case Disposition
